The children came up with their own challenges to complete

- Y1 have chosen to write the word hope 100 times and get the ball in the net 100 times
- Y2 have chosen to make people smile at least 100 times over the course of the day and complete an obstacle race with 10 obstacles 10 times
- Y3 have chosen to each run a 100 metres
- Y4 have chosen to make 100 thank you cards for the NHS
- Y5 have chosen to write 100 letters to send to people living in care homes or children that are currently battling serious illnesses in hospital
- Y6 have chosen to complete a 'circuit' of 100 (in total) of physical challenges

The children chose to ask for pledges to complete their Captain Tom 100 challenge. The children want to use the money raised to create an outdoor reading for pleasure area they can use at break and lunchtime with some of the money also being sent to the Captain Tom Foundation.

I was so proud of the way in which the children embraced this idea and their chosen challenges. They showed real empathy and care towards others and I was particularly touched by their kindness towards the NHS and the elderly as well as children who are in long term hospital care.
